Founder's Letter

Stronger Together

2020 was challenging, particularly for socially isolated and anxious elders. But 2020 also highlighted the resilience and strength of older adults, the incredible diligence and commitment of caregivers for the elderly and the abundance of kindness from across Hong Kong, including from our student community. Together, we stepped up to respond to the increased demand for support and care for needy elders.

To meet urgent physical needs, generous friends of Mighty Oaks donated over 74,000 face masks, 200 hand sanitizers and over 5,000 blessing bags for the elderly.

To meet the need for connection, students and their families recorded over 50 encouraging music videos, wrote thousands of cards, baked thousands of cookies and knitted over 400 scarves and beanies for elders. These were much appreciated by elders from over 50 elder facilities throughout HK. The pandemic offered opportunities for families to cultivate compassion together.

We demonstrated our admiration and appreciation for caregivers for the elderly through encouraging video cards from well-respected social workers, home-made cookies and cakes, handwritten cards, gifts of hand cream and face mask holders.

We adapted quickly by providing our intergenerational learning programs online. Although challenging, a silver lining has been technology adoption by the elderly. Initially unfamiliar with this learning platform, they soon responded well. Building trust and a relationship between the old and young can indeed grow and blossom online.

Many of us treasure older mentors, who have advised and guided us. We encourage the young to understand the need to learn from and care for elders and show them the respect they deserve. Working with the Institute of Active Ageing (HK Poly U) and Prof. Teresa Tsien, we developed a series of interactive talks to enable youth to embrace important life values through connecting with elders.

As we reflect on 2020, we are heartened by your generosity of spirit, enabling us to touch the lives of 21,000 elders and caregivers for the elderly. You show us that kindness prevails in uncertain times. Thanks for being part of a collective effort to connect the old and young. Indeed, we are stronger together.

CRAFTING & PAINTING FOR A GOOD CAUSE: ANCHOR CHILDREN WITH ELDERS ("ACE") ART 2020

ACE Art promotes understanding and respect for the elderly through creative art expression.

The number of participants doubled this year! We were delighted to have over 2,000 young artists from 10 schools who turned their art skills into love and care by crafting and painting for a good cause. Apart from an independent panel of judges, we were grateful to have over 3,000 people voting for the People's Choice Award.



The theme was "Chinese Opera" - much loved by elders in Hong Kong.

Through participating in this programme, young artists also learnt to appreciate our cultural and natural heritage, which is an irreplaceable source of life and inspiration.

A special mention for young artists from the Singapore International School (Hong Kong) who visited residents in the care home next to the school before starting their design journey.

ACE Academy

'LOVE WITHOUT BORDERS, LEARN WITHOUT BOUNDARIES'

With the theme 'Stronger Together: Forest of Fans' in Term 1, students learned about the livelihood of older adults through hearing their personal stories and decorating bamboo fans with their elder partners after school at the elderly homes/centres. These in-person lessons provided time and space for young and old to interact and share amusing stories, allowing students to improve their communication skills and making elders feel appreciated and valued.

During the second wave of the pandemic with suspension of schools in Term 2, we adapted quickly by providing our intergenerational learning programmes online. 'Radiating Love within the Family' was the theme for our ACE Academy online lessons to promote 'love without borders, learn without boundaries'. We encouraged students to support and show their care to one another, with a particular focus on their grandparents and older family members. Our thanks to the Hong Kong Club Foundation for sponsoring this programme.

Let's hear from our Board member, Dr. Patrick Lam:

'When I was helping the elders to put on their graduation gowns, the students arrived. The man I was helping shouted the name of his young partner immediately. The youth ran to him and promptly sat by his side, almost like he was his grandson. I could see excitement and anticipation in their faces.'

'When I asked what his most unforgettable experience was - without hesitation – the elder answered, "The most exciting part was the opportunity to wear the full academic dress. I saw my children and grandchildren graduate, but I never thought that one day it would be my turn."'

富坤伯伯, is 78 years old. He used to be a Chinese teacher. Despite living in an elderly home and relying on a wheelchair to move around, he regularly finds inspiration to continue to write poetry. ACE Talks

Anchor Children with Elders (ACE) TALKS

We developed a series of ACE Talks in 2020 to enable students to learn about aging, enhancing intergenerational understanding and respect. All five ACE Talks were devel oped by experienced educators and volunteer professionals, with support from the Institute of Active Ageing, Hong Kong Polytechnic University ("HK PolyU's IAA"), under the guidance of Prof. Teresa Tsien, the first director of the HK PolyU's IAA.

We are excited to launch the talks in the academic year of 2020/21, and six schools have already signed up for our talks.

WIDENING THE CIRCLES OF LOVE DURING THE PANDEMIC

1 Masks4Elders

Masks4Elders: With support from generous donors, we widened the circles of love by donating over 74,000 surgical masks and 200 hand sanitizers to needy elders in care homes during the pandemic.

Behind the Music: Full of Love & Compassion

Rosey Chan is a contemporary pianist, composer, sound designer, cultural curator, and Steinway Artist, living in London. When she heard of the plight of Hong Kong people and the shortage of masks, she decided to waive all her fees from a recent project with world-renowned architect Andre Fu to buy surgical masks to donate to needy elders through Mighty Oaks Foundation. Hats off to them!

2 Love Boxes 4 Elders (including gift bags)

We received over 5,000 gift packs from students, families, supporters and friends of Mighty Oaks. Each love box or gift came with a beautifully hand-crafted card bearing messages of love and care. The gifts and cards were a source of great delight for elders in care homes receiving these gifts, knowing that people care, even though we cannot visit.











3 Cookies4Elders:

Caregivers in elder facilities worked above and beyond their job duties during the pandemic. The Mighty Oaks community wanted to thank these caregivers by blessing them with cookies and cakes, with a note of thanks. Our community baked over 4,400 cookies and cakes and delivered them to elder facilities for caregivers.

Caregivers' reactions upon receiving the cookies and cakes:

'The sweet surprises were welcome treats during an immensely challenging time for care home staff. We shared them with every department within our care home. Every staff member got to experience and taste the love, knowing that the community supports them and thinks of them.'

'The words on the thank you card touched my heart and reinforced my passion for taking care of the elderly.'





Sharing from volunteer bakers:

'I enjoyed the experience as having a purpose behind baking made it a lot more gratifying - it was great knowing that these cookies would bring a smile to the faces of the caregivers.'

'It was a great activity to do with friends, especially when baking on a larger scale to give back to the community. I asked a few friends to join me for a baking day!'

4 Scarves & Beanies 4 Elders:

Knitting forged bonds between people of all ages, spreading love and joy with creativity. Our volunteers joined hands to create over 400 hand knitted scarves and beanies for singleton elders and elders in care homes.

5 Videos4Elders:



Income


