





## **CITY WIDE IMPACT**

Mighty Oaks started operating in Hong Kong in 2017. We are Hong Kong's first non-profit focused solely on intergenerational practices to address social isolation and foster community through arts-based programmes. By pairing elder facilities with neighboring schools, our impactful programmes create meaningful connections and build a more interdependent Hong Kong for all ages.





Except for the North district and the Sham Shui Po district, our programmes have reached 16 districts in Hong Kong in 2024

Yauyau reassuringly.


"Mistakes are part of learning," shared Grandma Ha.

68.3% of elderly individuals in Hong Kong experience feelings of loneliness\*, while many students report a sense of hopelessness regarding their futures. The gap in passing down heritage between generations has widened.

In response to these challenges, Mighty Oaks made a strategic pivot in 2024 to concentrate exclusively on an arts-based approach for all it's iGen relationship building programmes.

We have reinvigorated our mission and vision laying the groundwork for three strategic service pillars that embody our commitment to Anchor Children with Elders: ACE ACADEMY, ACE LINKS and ACE COMMUNITY.

## FOUNDER'S MESSAGE: FOOTPRINTS ACROSS GENERATIONS



Dear Friends,

Reflecting on 2024, I am filled with gratitude and optimism. Your unwavering support has been the heartbeat of our mission to bring old and young together, not just to bridge gaps but to transform futures, enabling harmony to emerge from apparent contradictions.

Our structured iGen learning programmes help vulnerable elders to develop social connections, embrace life-long learning and pass down cultural heritage. Youth befriend elders who may be 70 + years older, developing empathy, respect and understanding.



Together, let's continue to pay tribute to HK's elderly, often unsung heroes who have made our city glow, whose contributions have quietly shaped HK's identity. When young and old come together, incredible things happen.

We celebrate these outcomes, generated from our programme self-assessments:

Increased social connections: Both generations felt heard and cared for, reducing social isolation.

Improved intergenerational understanding: Old and young gained a better understanding of each other, becoming more confident and taking more initiative in communicating with people from other generations.

#### **Enhanced well-being:**

Youth help elders feel more energised and purposeful.



## FOUNDER'S MESSAGE: FOOTPRINTS ACROSS GENERATIONS



Going forward, we plan to:

**Strengthen core partnerships**: exploring collaborative strategies with our core partners amidst government budget reductions. One example is the rollout of our 3-year iGen programme in all 7 care homes of one core partner, for old and young to grow together through horticulture and visual arts.

**Enhance character education through iGen learning**: All is changing the importance of traditional knowledge learning. Our iGen learning programmes are being embraced by more schools, with youth learning better communication, resilience, and adaptability from their elderly buddies. One example is the growth of our ACE Schools programme, where elders co-learn with youth during school hours as part of the school curriculum.

**Enhance impact evaluation**: We plan to enhance evaluation metrics and feedback mechanisms across our core programmes to increase transparency and accountability, maximize our community impact, and create a lasting difference together. One example is the launch of an external evaluation for our longstanding ACE Academy programme.

## **ACE ACADEMY**



Since 2017, Mighty Oaks has Anchored Community with Elders (ACE) through four key values of LOVE

### **ACE GROW TOGETHER**

This three-year horticulture programme is powered by an anonymous private foundation. Launched in 2024, we aim to bridge gaps in the social service sector by fostering collaboration between elder facilities and schools. We're excited to pair a Salvation Army (SA) care home with a SA nursery and a care home with a primary school from the SA family. Over 3 years, this programme will serve all 7 SA care homes.

### PROJECT SPARKLE

Project Sparkle has paired 40 elder care facilities with 40 primary schools in a nurturing programme centered on the transformative power of art, music and movement. This 2 year programme, powered by Operation Santa Claus and Social Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development Fund, concluded in 2024.



Bringing students from schools into elderly home, old and young plant, play and joyfully create artwork together. Through discussions on life, death, hope, patience, and the appreciation of beauty, they cultivate not just plants but also a nurturing community where both generations flourish together.

Gonggong Chan lives at The Salvation
Army Bradbury Home of Loving Kindness.
Illness and age had left him feeling
distant from family—most days were
quiet and slow. That changed when he
joined the ACE Grow Together class with
students from the Salvation Army Tin Ka
Ping School.



One of them was 11-year-old Hei-hei, whose laughter and energy gently drew Gonggong Chan out of his shell. Hesitant at first, he soon found himself smiling, playing games, and sharing snacks. Their time soon ended with a song sung by Hei-hei:

#藍色的天空任鳥飛, 水邊青青小草源珠樹, 心中永永遠遠潭流 你, 你是我家." "The blue sky lets birds fly, the green 你, 你是我家." "The blue sky lets me lie down. grass by the water lets me lie down. you are my home."

As the children left, he waved goodbye with a soft smile. He's now looking forward to the next planting day—and seeing Heihei again. This is what Mighty Oaks is about: helping elders feel seen and giving children a way to connect with their community.



"I've witnessed the warm interactions between elders and children, as they work together from planting to harvesting. Our mission is to bring children together with elders with less mobility, encouraging co-learning across generations. I'm looking forward to the next three years, hoping this initiative will flourish and bring our community closer together."

Under ACE Academy, Project Sparkle wrapped up in 2024, highlighting the importance of iGen connections. The programme offered arts and crafts, as well as music and movement classes for both young and old. Some sessions were held online during the pandemic. Over two years, we reached 505 elders, promoting joy and companionship, while engaging 770 students to foster empathy, respect, and a deeper sense of community.

## ACE ACADEMY PROJECT SPARKLE

My name is Wing-nok, and I'm in Primary 4. When I first started spending time with Tse porpor, it wasn't easy. Her reminders sometimes felt like nagging, and I often got frustrated, wishing she'd let me do things my way.

However, as I got to know her better, I realized she wasn't trying to control me—she wanted to help me grow. Tse porpor taught me words I'd never heard before, and I began to see how much I could learn from her.

I used to be quite competitive with my classmates about art materials, always wanting to grab the best supplies for myself, without considering what others might need.

But over time, I learned the importance of collaboration. Now, I invite my teammates to help gather supplies after class and tidy up. It feels good to be thoughtful, and it makes our group stronger.

Mighty Oaks leads the way in cultivating iGen leadership through ACE Links - a customised empowerment programme tailored for secondary school students (ACE Fellows), young olds (ACE Friends), and primary schools (ACE Schools).

Young old volunteers share their valuable life lessons, introducing hobbies that cultivate shared interests, and teach positive values to primary school students. It helps create meaningful connections that celebrate and preserve our heritage in Hong Kong, while enhancing self-esteem and a more positive outlook for these volunteers.

As part of a citywide movement of care, ACE Art united 10 schools to create over 1,700 personalised Chinese fans—each a heartfelt message of love and respect for community elders, including those in care homes, singletons, and hidden elders. Led by Mighty Oaks, this powerful gesture reminded our seniors they are seen, valued, and cherished by the next generation.

With generous support from Chinachem, outstanding student artworks were showcased in a public mall, amplifying community awareness and celebrating the creativity and compassion of children across Hong Kong.



Margaret, a retired nurse, found a new path as an aluminium-wire art instructor and dedicated Mighty Oaks volunteer. Her journey of perseverance and reinvention continues to inspire students through in-school value education talks, proving that purpose doesn't fade with age—it evolves.



Mighty Oaks was proud to be the sole HK representative at Global Intergenerational Week (GIW), a vibrant international initiative led by Generations Working Together. With the powerful theme "Intergenerational Practice is ESSENTIAL," the event united changemakers from Australia, Singapore, and across the Asia-Pacific to exchange ideas and spark action. Representing Hong Kong, Mighty Oaks showcased its ACE programme—demonstrating how anchoring children with elders cultivates deep iGen bonds and empowers community leadership across generations.



Mighty Oaks joined the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) Summit, organised by the Canadian International School, where our founder Ms Poh Lee Tan shared with over 200 aspiring student leaders and NGOs representatives in the opening panel. In the interactive workshop, students explored what it's like to live like an elder, with physical and mental limitations, through simulation.

We also invited young olds to share their personal stories—speaking candidly about loneliness, feeling invisible in society, and the emotional challenges they face. Their message was simple but profound: sometimes, they just need to be seen and cared for.



In a night filled with warmth and purpose, Mighty Oaks' fundraising dinner brought together supporters and partners committed to iGen change, raising over **HK\$3.3 million** to further our mission. A highlight of the evening was a heartfelt collaboration: elders from Mighty Oaks' programmes teamed up with chefs from the Fullerton Hotel to prepare cherished family recipes, offering guests a meaningful taste of tradition and love.

The evening also featured a moving orchestral performance by students from Hong Kong International School, 220 wonderful spatulas painted by students from the Chinese International School, and a strong choir from the Chinese International School. This celebration of community, generosity and enduring bonds between generations was sponsored by Shaw Foundation (event sponsor) and Ng Teng Fong Foundation (venue sponsor), for which heartfelt thanks.



Mighty Oaks brought festive cheer to the ACE Centre at M7, 7 Mallory Street, Wan Chai, transforming the space into a joyful hub of celebration and connection. Elderly centres members were warmly welcomed into this vibrant community setting for a day filled with meaningful interactions and holiday spirit.

The Christmas Fair featured engaging activities—from interactive games and ornament-making to photo booths and student-led carol sing-alongs—creating moments of laughter, warmth, and shared joy. It was a heartwarming celebration that beautifully bridged generations through the magic of the season.

## ACE COMMUNITY OEP

Samantha loves to draw, so she joined a Chinese calligraphy class at a community centre through Project Sparkle.

After a summer of practicing brush strokes and characters, her class visited a nearby elderly home—this time, to learn from an elder who had been doing calligraphy for years. When they arrived, Samantha and her friends were surprised. Boxes were stacked high, the space felt cramped, and many of the elders looked frail. It was a little overwhelming at first.

But as they began writing together and playing games, the atmosphere softened. Smiles appeared, conversations started, and the room felt warmer.

Samantha returned once more. The quiet joy on the elders' faces stayed with her. It made her realise how much a simple visit could mean—and how easily we can make someone feel remembered.
